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Fifi Heart Surgery follow-up...

Because of all of you, *Rotary Gift of Life*, and the Montefiore Hospital of New York, this little boy (known as Fifi, Tifi and Jeaninior, interchangeably) is alive and well today and is

now back in Haiti with his family. He almost didn't make it, however. As you recall from our November 2006 M&S Newsletter, Fifi was found sitting against a wall in front of the Government Hospital in Port-au-Prince last summer by Susie Krabacher. Fifi had been given just six months to live, due to heart valves severely damaged by rheumatic fever. Without immediate heart surgery to

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Williamson Project Update

The Mercy & Sharing ***Williamson Project*** lies about an hour north of Port-au-Prince and consists of several acres of already purchased land and nearly completed design plans for a Therapy Center/Handicapped Orphanage, a Nutrition Center/Chapel (where the children and widows in the surrounding vicinity can participate in various nutrition and education programs), a Healthy Children's Orphanage, Elementary and Secondary Schools, a Trade School and a Hospice to care for our terminally ill children. Other support buildings will include an office, a maintenance building, staff/volunteer accommodations and a storage depot.

The design phase is well underway with the generous and untiring support of *Galambos Architects*, an Aspen-based design firm owned

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by long-time contributors to Mercy & Sharing - John and Robin Galambos.

Galambos Architects is generously donating their time and incredible talents to the project free of charge. Jodie Fielding of *Galambos* has enthusiastically begun work on the Handicapped/Therapy Center, the design of which will allow for the housing of 100 handicapped children, 20 care-takers and a 24-hour nursing staff. The centerpiece of the building is the Therapy Center that the children can easily access for daily physiotherapy. The design also incorporates a central courtyard where the children can exercise, play and simply enjoy being outdoors.

The Williamson Project represents a new chapter in Mercy & Sharing's efforts to provide the highest quality of life and the best possible future for the many handicapped, orphaned and/or terminally ill children now under our care in Port-au-Prince. Our goal is to address the comprehensive, long-term needs of our children, especially in our desire to prepare them for adulthood and the responsibilities that will come with their eventual independence.

The estimated total construction cost for the Williamson Project is currently about \$1.5 million (U.S.D.). Mercy & Sharing is actively seeking capital contributions to help offset that cost. Our goal is to raise at least 50% of the needed funds before we break ground. Health Center update

Since the beginning of 2006, M&S has been operating a Community Health Center at Delmas 75, in Port-au-Prince. This is just the first step to organize and develop a health facility in such a poor and neglected neighborhood.

Since March 2006, we have started a Prevention Program for Cervical Cancer, performing PAP tests and taking action with those patients with positive test results. We have performed more than 400 Pap Tests, from which 22.4% are positive, which is quite high. We hope to increase the number of Pap Tests performed up to 1,200 over the next 6 months. Our Health Center is also prepared to receive emergency cases including emergency deliveries and C-sections.

replace his failing valves (a surgery which is generally not available in Haiti) there was little hope for his survival.

Thanks to the tireless efforts of many people, Fifi was brought to New York along with his father Yves in January of 2007 for surgery. All went well at first, but then Fifi suddenly went into cardiac arrest a few days after the valves were replaced. He also suffered a stroke, and then yet another cardiac arrest at a later point.

Initially, things were looking very bad for Fifi, and we were all very concerned that he might not make it, or that he might suffer from permanent paralysis or other major problems. Plans were made to eventually transfer Fifi to a rehabilitation center nearby for extensive physical therapy for recovery.

Fifi had other plans, however. Somehow, through the grace of God, Fifi made a rapid and miraculous recovery, confounding his doctors and caregivers. Within a few days he had recovered enough to be able to travel back to Haiti and to reunite with his family.

We have an Out Patient Clinic in which we provide consultations in Internal Medicine, Pediatrics, ObGyn and Surgery in which we have seen around 900 to 1,000 patients monthly, 45% of whom are children.

The surgical procedures have just started. We have already performed four hysterectomies and several minor surgeries. Our clinical laboratory has performed over 1,000 tests so far. Our Health Center also gives support to the M&S Orphanages and performs routine check-ups of all the children from the M&S School in Cite Soleil.

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Jessi - progress update

Jessi Guerrier is the beautiful and bright 7 year old girl whom you might remember from our November 2005 Newsletter.



Jessi was found by M&S after being abandoned at the Government Hospital when she was about one. She's currently a third-grader at our John Branchizio School in Cazeau, Port-au-Prince. Since birth, Jessi has suffered from a congenital amputation of the right leg just below the knee, and a contra lateral rigid club of the left foot, which have made normal walking impossible for her up to now.



Through *Cure International*, Jessi recently traveled to Cap Haitian where Dr. Scott Nelson, an American orthopedist who is the Medical Director for *Cure International* in Santo Domingo, D.R, examined her. Dr. Nelson determined that Jessi needed a minimum of two medical procedures. The first was a procedure to gradually straighten her clubfoot through a series of soft casts called "Ponsetti", during which her cast is changed every two weeks in Port-au-Prince.

The second procedure will be the removal of the fleshy ball at the end of her right leg to allow for the fitting of a prosthesis. The ultimate outcome after the surgery and the fitting of the prosthesis is that for the first time in her life, Jessi will be able to walk like a normal child.

Currently, we are in the process of negotiating with a hospital in the Dominican Republic for Jessi's surgery and hospital stay. Once the calendar is set for Jessi's trip, one of our Haitian caregivers will travel to the Dominican Republic to spend the week with Jessi and to provide her with as much comfort and love as possible.

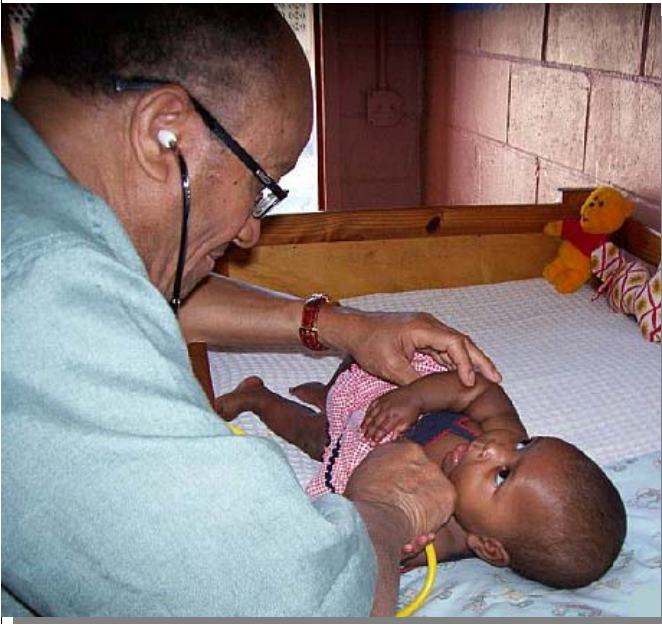

Dr. Barrau, a cardiologist with a highly successful practice near New York City, recently visited our orphanages in Haiti to evaluate some of our children. It was determined that one of our infants, Patricia, is suffering from a serious congenital heart defect. On his return to the United States, Dr. Barrau

contacted a colleague, Dr. Sean Levchuck, the Director of Pediatric Interventional Cardiology at St. Francis Hospital in Roslyn, New York. Dr. Levchuck has graciously agreed to perform heart surgery for Patricia free of charge. Dr. Levchuck has been an active member of Rotary International's Gift of Life program since joining the staff of St. Francis in 1997, and has operated on approximately 85 children for Gift of Life.

Dr. Levchuck says: "I live by that theory that 'One hundred years from now it won't matter what kind of car you drove or what kind of house you lived in. The only thing that

matters is how important you were in the life of a child'. St. Francis Hospital really feels the same way," continues Levchuck, who is quick to acknowledge the team effort required to provide this service. "I am only a surgeon. There are also the nurses, the anesthesiologist, the cardiologist and the hospital that are donating their time and skills. We are all part of the big team. And at the end of the runway, we are all pulling the chain in the right direction."

Mercy and Sharing expresses our deepest gratitude to these two generous and gifted physicians, Dr. Barrau and Dr. Levchuck, who freely give their time and their talents to save the lives of many children, especially our baby Patricia.

Our community activity is expanding in the areas of vaccinations, home visits, health education sessions, family planning and follow up of suspicious or positive STD and Pap Test results. Also we are now doing Epidemiological Surveillance, which is reported to The Haitian Ministry of Public Health. During the last few months, the most prevalent diseases among children were malaria, urinary tract infections, malnutrition and typhoid fever. The staff is 38 people, all Haitians, of which 8 are Medical Doctors and 12 are nurses and technicians.

Mercy & Sharing does not believe in charity. In all of our projects there is a common thread: opportunity. We teach our children, and in return they learn and teach others. We feed them, and when they are old enough we teach them to feed themselves and to feed others. We educate them in their youth, they learn a trade in their adolescence, and in return they provide for themselves and their families. There is no empowerment in charity, so we choose to empower through education instead. We employ a staff of over 300 native Haitians (average salary is USD \$100 per month), who mentor, nurture, love and respect the children. In return our children learn to love and respect others.
