Mercy and Sharing has recently hired several new top-level personnel in Haiti, including Mr. Gary Downey, the Deputy to the President of M&S, who will oversee all Haitian operations, including our soon-to-be-opened Prenatal Clinic. Mr. Chad Snyder, our new Assistant Deputy, will oversee our Abandoned Infant Unit, Orphanages, Warehouse and our new Nutrition Program. The new Child & Youth Pastor for our Cazeau Orphanage, and the new Bible Teacher at our John Branchizio School, is Mr. Romain Raynold. And last but not least, we have hired Carol Horn from Canada to be our North American Deputy who has been working with Susie, Trish and the staff in Haiti.

Mr. Downey has over thirty years experience with various international missions, including the *United Methodist Church's International Outreach*. Gary's most recent employment was as a top-level administrator with the Albert Schweitzer Hospital (H.A.S.) in Haiti, and Gary comes very highly recommended. Gary is

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to be the result of voodoo curses placed on the families, even though the causes of many of these kinds of birth defects are well known in the developed world and are easily prevented with the most basic prenatal health care.

Jessi and *Mercy and Sharing* have been blessed by a chance meeting with Esther King of *King's Kids* - a Canadian organization that raises funds needed to bring children with deformities like Jessi's to Canada for assessment and surgery. *The Vancouver Hospital* which hosts *King's Kids* is very supportive of Esther, along with her dedicated team of nurses and support workers.

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Paola Surgery Follow-up

Sometimes birthdays are dreaded. This November 2nd was mine, and I have to tell you about a miracle. These days, every time I see a miracle I have to tell someone about it because with so much tragedy around us miracles may go by unnoticed, and I think if we don't acknowledge them when they do happen, then God may decide to perform them somewhere other than here.

For four years, Paola, the little girl you read about in our May 2005 Newsletter, has waited for surgery that would transform her into a normal little girl. Paola was born with a severe cleft palate, the appearance of both sexes and also had no separation between her urinary tract and colon. Paola was still beautiful to us, however. She frequently had a great number of serious infections, trouble swallowing and sometimes trouble breathing, among other problems.

When Paola was an infant, her mother screamed and cried and ran away, abandoning her in my arms. At times we were discouraged. With Paola's many different and complicated problems we learned that it would take a team of very specialized surgeons to correct her deformities, and that the expense would be great. *Mercy and Sharing* has seventy-two other terminally ill and severely handicapped children who have also been abandoned or whose parents are dead. We are in a constant state of fund raising for medical care and corrective surgery. Sometimes it's exhausting, and sometimes we have to compete for

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geon believes that she can salvage Jessi's left leg. Her right leg, which now ends with just a stub several inches below the knee, will have to undergo surgery to allow for the fitting of a prosthetic lower-leg.

Mercy and Sharing is covering the cost of air travel and accommodation for Jessi and Carol Horn, who will accompany Jessi into Canada until Jessi feels comfortable with her temporary host family in Vancouver. *Mercy and Sharing* will also provide warm clothes for Jessi since the weather in Vancouver is obviously very different from the weather in Haiti!

We eagerly look forward to the day (soon!) when Jessi will stand and walk like a normal little girl. This will be an enormous improvement over the way she gets around now by walking on her knees, which must be unbearably painful, but she never lets it get her down! Pray for a successful operation

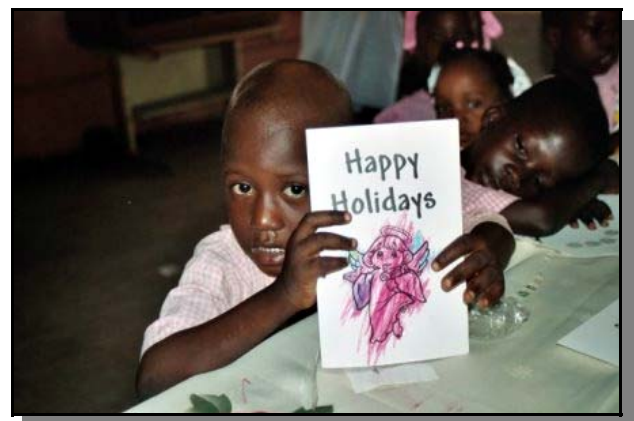

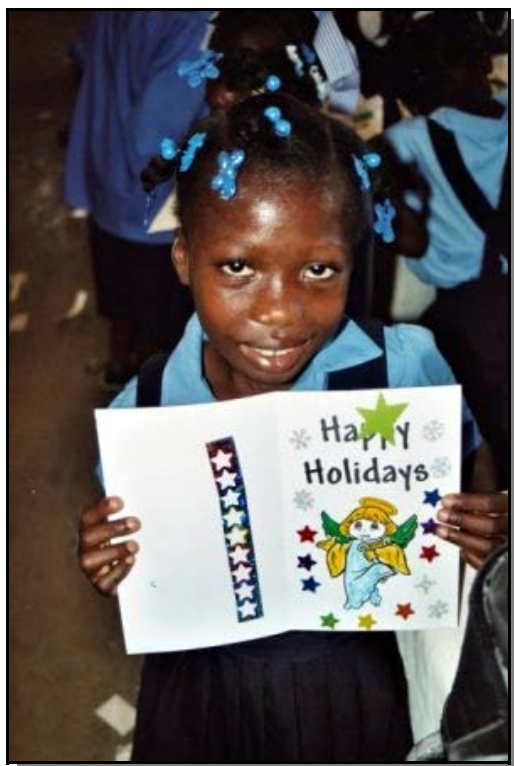

Nutrition Center Projects

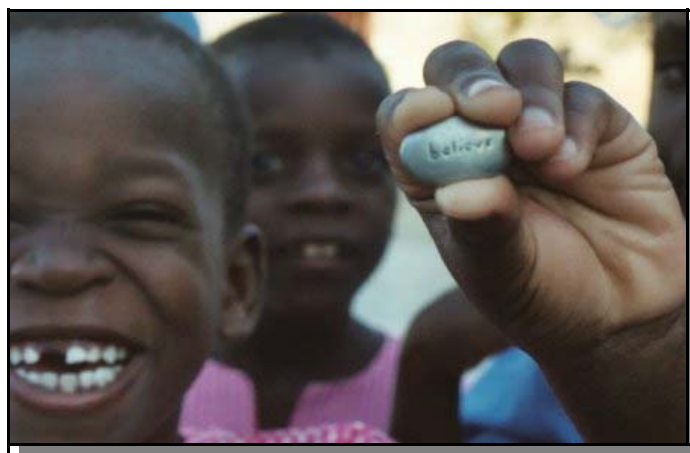
When one travels to Haiti, the face of hunger is one of the first faces one sees. Hunger steals life from the most vulnerable, the children. Without proper nutrition, many of these children will not see tomorrow, and many others will never meet their developmental norms.

Mercy and Sharing is now undertaking a major new project in its mission - the implementation of three major new Nutrition Centers. These centers will feed approximately 1,500 children at least one well-balanced meal every day.

The new nutrition centers will be located in Hinche (the interior of Haiti), in Terrier Rouge (the north of Haiti) and in several Haitian refugee camps just across the border in the Dominican Republic. Plans are well underway in implementing these Centers.

Funds are urgently needed to help get these projects off the ground...

In starting these Nutrition Centers, we knew that the financial strain on M&S would be significant, but we have been asked to help and we can't just stand by and watch children starve to death. Please help us in any way that you can. Additional information and photos will be included in our next newsletter. Thank you in advance for your urgently needed assistance.

Needs List -- We have many needs for over 2,500 children, orphans and special needs children...

As an organization committed to giving 100% to the children, you can help us by funding (or in-kind donation) of these items in bulk (for shipping purposes), and for financial support. We realize items by the case are costly, but they are unrealistically expensive or unavailable, in Haiti. You can be crucial to our survival by sponsoring certain items monetarily. Funds are needed for:

- **Equipment – all kinds of office & waiting-room furniture for our Clinic.**
- **Ambulance for transporting critically ill children to our new Clinic.**
- **Funds for Supplies – laundry detergent; shampoo; soap; mosquito repellent; baby powder, etc.**
- **MONTHLY Sponsors for individual projects.**
- **Guardian Angel Program Sponsors (see www.haitichildren.org for details).**

Mercy & Sharing does not believe in charity. In all of our projects there is a common thread: opportunity. We teach our children and in return they learn and teach others. We feed them, and when they are old enough we teach them to feed themselves and to feed others. We educate them in their youth, they learn a trade in their adolescence, and in return they provide for themselves and their families. There is no empowerment in charity, so we choose to empower instead. We employ a staff of over 140 native Haitians (average salary is USD \$70 per month), who mentor, nurture, love and respect the children. In return our children learn to love and respect others.
